It's More Than A Feeling

I still remember the experience in grade school of passing out valentines to the whole class. We made large folders with our names on them and hung them on the wall then passed out our valentines. I wonder: Do they still do that in school?

Valentine's Day owes its origin to two Roman Christian martyrs both named Valentine. One was a priest who was martyred on February 14, A.D. 269, and the other was a bishop of Terni. It is possible the two martyrs may be referring to the same man.

There is no obvious connection to romantic love; although in 1998 the Irish tourist board, wishing to promote Dublin as the capital of romantic love, asserted that Valentine had been put to death for conducting weddings for Roman soldiers contrary to the order of Emperor Claudius II. Another legend said that when Valentine was condemned to death, he cured the daughter of the judge of her blindness and sent her a letter signed "your Valentine." Also pushing Valentine's Day toward romantic love was its proximity to the Roman fertility festival celebrated on February 15 called the Lupercalia. In the Middle Ages it was believed that birds chose their mate on Valentine's Day. Gradually the day was seen as a time for people to pick their true love and give them some token of their love. By the early 19th century the love token had turned into a card. The love token today lives on in the giving of flowers, candy, and other gifts.

As Christians we celebrate the physical aspects of romantic love as a good gift from God. The Bible takes a very positive and healthy stance toward the physical expression of love. The Church has struggled with this through the centuries: witness the attempt of some Christians to interpret the *Song of Solomon* as an allegory of Christ's love for the Church instead of a forthright celebration of human love.

But as Christians we realize that romantic love has its limitations because it is fueled by passion and emotion and therefore is changeable and volatile. Love understood simply as feeling and emotion cannot sustain friendship, marriage, and doing the right thing for the people we do not like. For us, true love takes us beyond how we feel; it is a matter of the will, a commitment we make, an action and a way of doing things that we choose. Yes, love is ultimately a choice, and it has a point of reference for us.

The reference point is the self-giving and sacrificial love of God shown to us in Jesus Christ who came and died for us. Paul writes in Romans 5:8:

But God proves his love for us in that while we were sinners Christ died for us.

Who knows about the historical accuracy concerning the two Valentines, but if they were martyred, it was the self-giving and sacrificial love shown in Jesus Christ that motivated them.
