

God calls us to proclaim the Gospel and demonstrate Christ's love for all.



When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. - Acts 2:1-4

Central family,

When the apostles were gathered in the upper room on that day of Pentecost, they were caught off guard. They suddenly and unexpectedly found themselves doing a new thing among their usual ritual. Previously, they had gathered together to pray and share a meal, just as they had done with their teacher, friend and brother, Jesus. The ritual or weekly gathering continued until that day when the Spirit rushed upon them as a gust of wind and knocked them off their feet. In that moment, they were amazed by the presence of the Spirit - filling and emboldening them with a sense of familiarity and liberation. They were able to speak in a way that was unique to them and yet was divinely God's own breath. I'm sure this was not what they expected as a God-encounter.

Well, here's our Pentecost moment, Central Lutheran, People of Christ. We continue to 'gather' as community of disciples (albeit in our own homes), and we await the pandemic to pass us by like the plague over ancient Egypt. We have prayed for normal to return. But it is clear that the pandemic won't leave us yet, and we are not going to be the same disciples again. In our own homes, we are not the same families as this time last year. We are entering this season of Lent feeling like we never truly left the last season of Lent. But if this is our reality, how do we move forward out of the feeling of despair? We let the Spirit overwhelm us like the disciples.

It is time to shift our expectations to join the spirit of surprise and faithful liberation of the disciples. We know that we cannot go back to pre-pandemic days. We cannot change that. We cannot change the losses we've encountered and have grieved (and continue to grieve), like the disciples lost Jesus. But we can move forward with what we do have as a resurrected people. Now is the time to shift from yearning for a return to pre-pandemic 'normal' to now accepting the gifts we do have with gratitude and hope for the future. We can give great thanks for God still being present in our homes, speaking words of promise and hope that is unbound by attendance numbers, hope that is not constrained by a building, hope that binds us with love.

While we look forward to the day we can safely gather in person, we have accepted the fact that our online presence is permanent. Our online community has grown by nearly double what it was a year ago, and God's message of resurrection is reaching nearly 400 viewers! That is only part of our new identity as we grow through the process of change. So until then, please, get vaccinated, wear your mask, wash your hands, keep safely distant from one another – all as a great expression of your care for the other – and get ready for God to do a new thing.



Faye passed peacefully on January 16, 2021 in Mesquite, TX.



Lutheran Campus Ministry at West Virginia University, Morgantown, Va., led by Tony Setley, campus pastor, offers students a spiritual home and space to explore vocation.



A SPIRITUAL HOME FOR FUTURE LEADERS

Stuck in traffic at West Virginia University (WVU), when seemingly all of Morgantown's 28,000 students are trying to get to class, you'd be hard-pressed not to notice the fire engine red Lutheran Campus Ministry Chapel with its curved roof, just south of the main crosswalk.

"The building was very interesting; that was probably my first impression," sophomore Lilly Simmons said.

The architectural oddity might draw students for a brief chat with Tony Setley, campus pastor, but however they come, he said, "they are comfortable enough to ask questions, and that can always lead to something bigger."

Graduate student Nathan Blake recalled his first visit. "I was at a really rough place spiritually, and the time for normal Sunday services had already passed, and I was like, 'I need something, but I don't know what.' I remembered that 6 p.m. service time, and I wandered up the hill, snuck in the back [pew] and I just kept coming. It was exactly what I needed."

In and beyond worship, Setley encourages students to set the tone for campus ministry. Simmons said she's loved leading monthly social activities such as ax-throwing or miniature golf. The gatherings make a difference. "I can't overstate the importance of having a place where you can experience spirituality, but also having a group of people you can experience it with," Blake said.

In addition to serving as students' spiritual home, Lutheran Campus Ministry at WVU plans this fall to offer a literal rent-free

home for some people discerning calls to ministry. The student housing, called <u>Luther</u>. <u>House</u>, is located behind the chapel in a building that was formerly the parsonage for St. Paul Lutheran Church of Morgantown. Luther House students will lead chapel and explore seminary through a partnership with Wartburg Theological Seminary in Dubuque, lowa. **Both the seminary and campus** ministry are funded by Mission Support.

"Hopefully out of that, students will have some of the financial burden taken off, but also to have that ability to discern and engage with their faith in a way that will give them more answers to the questions about what God is calling them to do in this world," Setley said.
