[Paul writes:] ^{4b} If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: ⁵ circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; ⁶ as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.


⁷Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. ⁸More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ ⁹ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. ¹⁰I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, ¹¹ if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

¹² Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. ¹³ Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, ¹⁴ I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

READING OF THE GOSPEL: John 12:1-8

¹Six days before the Passover Jesus came to Bethany, the home of Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. ²There they gave a dinner for him. Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those at the table with him. ³Mary

took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus' feet, and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. ⁴ But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said, ⁵ "Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?" ⁶ (He said this not because he cared about the poor, but because he was a thief; he kept the common purse and used to steal what was put into it.) ⁷ Jesus said, "Leave her alone. 




COMMUNION



A Message About Lent: The invitation to Lent spoken on Ash Wednesday reminds us that we journey through this season together with the whole church. Lent is a time for deepening our connections with the communities that surround us. Reading the Scriptures invites you all to reflect on what it means to be in community with one another, with the world, with creation, and with God.

Midweek Lenten Vespers: We will walk through Lent together—a season of reflection, renewal, and drawing closer to God. Join us on **Wednesdays at 6:00** pm for Midweek Services and a Soup Supper as we journey in faith. We are combining our services with Emanuel Lutheran Church and will be meeting at Central.

Spring Festival: Come celebrate Spring with Central Lutheran! Our Spring Festival will be on **April 13 at noon** in front of the buildings. This all-ages event will include two egg hunts (divided by age), a bounce house, craft tables, and lots of games. Everyone from the neighborhood and community are welcome!

Egg Stuffing: Today, after worship, we will be filling our plastic eggs with candy and toys. The filled eggs will be used for the egg hunts during our Spring Festival.

Questions During Lent: We are tackling our goals head-on with design thinking. We have a question each week that bring us closer to understanding ourselves and achieving our goals. Be prepared to participate by answering questions with sticky notes on a board posted in the sanctuary (Sundays) or the Parish Hall (Wednesdays). We hope to see the board covered with ideas so bring your thinking caps.

The questions for this week are: How might we create leadership opportunities?

- a. How might we equip, and empower people to lead?
- b. What needs to happen for you to step into a leadership role?

Palm Sunday, April 13 at 10:30 am

Palm Sunday marks Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, a journey of hope and challenge. We begin worship outside at the labyrinth, where we gather with palms in hand. Led by the choir in song, we will process together into the sanctuary, waving our palm leaves.

Maundy Thursday, April 17 at 6:00 pm

On Maundy Thursday our Lenten observance comes to an end, and we gather with Christians around the world to celebrate the Three Days of Jesus' death and resurrection. We remember Christ's last meal with his disciples, but the central focus is his commandment that we live out the promise embodied in this meal. As Jesus washed his disciples' feet, so we are called to give and receive love in humble service to one another. Formed into a new body in Christ through this holy meal, we are transformed by the mercy we have received and carry it into the world. Departing worship in solemn silence, we anticipate the coming days.

Good Friday, April 18 at 6:00 pm

Life and death stand side by side as we enter into Good Friday. In John's passion account, Jesus reveals the power and glory of God, even as he is put on trial and sentenced to death. Standing with the disciples at the foot of the cross, we pray for the whole world in the ancient bidding prayer, as Christ's death offers life to all. We gather in solemn devotion, but always with the promise that the tree around which we assemble is indeed a tree of life. We depart silently, and we anticipate the culmination of the Three Days in the Easter Vigil.

Holy Saturday Cross & Sanctuary Decorating: One of the best traditions at Central Lutheran is decorating the cross for everyone to enjoy on Easter Sunday morning. We'll need a few people to help us **starting at 2:00 pm on Saturday, April 19th.** We'll move the cross to the Sanctuary and decorate the altar with lilies. All are welcome! Let us know if we can count on you!
